Study and **Living Costs**



Tuition Fees

Program costs vary depending on the field of study and length of the program but typically range from CAD 15,000 to CAD 30,000 per year.




Estimated Monthly Living Expenses

Accommodation: CAD 1,000-1,800 (shared or private).

Groceries: CAD 300-500.

Miscellaneous: CAD 200-500 (clothing, entertainment, etc.).





Other Costs



Mealth insurance: Mandatory for all students (CAD 75–150/month).



Accommodation & Transportation



Accommodation Options

Off-campus housing: Shared apartments, studio rentals, or homestays.

Temporary stays: Hotels or hostels while searching for permanent housing.

Online platforms for housing: Craigslist, Kijiji, or loc al Facebook groups. Be cautious of scams and verify accommodations before making payments.

BC Tenancy: Students renting accommodation in BC are required to sign a BC Tenancy Agreement. This agreement outlines the responsibilities and rights of both tenants and landlords under BC Tenancy Laws. For more information, visit the Residential Tenancy Branch.



Transportation

Public Transit: TransLink operates buses, SkyTrain, and SeaBus across

Metro Vancouver.

U-Pass: PLC students are not eligible for U-Pass.

Cycling: Many bike-friendly paths and rental options.

Driving: International licenses may be valid temporarily; check ICBC

requirements for conversion to a BC license.
